Project Pegasus

As the year draws to a close, so too does Project Pegasus, the ambitious communication and security upgrade which commenced at School at the start of the term. The project has involved a great deal of planning, meetings, behindthe-scenes preparation and months of onsite two installations by a number of workmen. The disruptions to school life and activities, for such a large scale operation, has been minimal, mainly due extent of the preparation and organisation, and the cooperation of the Staff and Boys.

Next year all the projects will be fully operational and this is what we have to look forward to:

PABX - A new telephone involved system has the installation of a state of the art switchboard, with new telephones and an automated call directing service which will save time and increase efficiency. Callers are now given the option to dial a number to go straight through the department thev require. In addition, for everyone's security, all telephone calls will be automatically recorded. We are already enjoying the benefits of this impressive new system.

Intercom - A brand new intercom system has been installed throughout the School, reaching into every single classroom and beyond; we are very pleased with this project as it has been difficult over the past 18 months without one. This project is 90% complete, one switch needs to be cleared by customs before it can be released and installed to finalise the job.

Biometrics - a biometrics system has been installed for efficient registration timekeeping for the Boys and Staff. Registration, signing in and entering absentees on a computer will now be a thing of the past as, with a simple press of the thumb, the new system will talk to our database and record all attendances. Morning registration will continue to be performed manually so that the boys do not lose that personal contact with their class tutors, however, latecomers. afternoon registration, extra mural practices, sport fixtures and compulsories will be done via the biometrics. Stations can be found at the security hut, in reception, outside the Department Marketing and Staffroom. outside the Portable handsets will be used for extra mural activities.

CCTV Security Cameras -CCTV cameras have been installed in every classroom, in passageways, courtyards and areas throughout the school for the safety and security of all. Security cameras are а maior deterrent for theft and, with the introduction of iPads at School next year, the timing of the installation of these cameras perfect. is Installation of new lockers and upgrading of current lockers will also be occurring over the following month.

WiFi, Network and Cabling all the above projects require WiFi and internet access which necessitated upgrading

In 2019 we will be expanding the Elective to include even more certified courses. We will focus on Technology Innovation well as Leadership. We will also be introducing two more languages in Mandarin and German.

Nonpareil Cambridge Academy

The best opportunities that come along sometimes are magically timed just for you. This has been true for myself, and for a number of the boys who have spent this inaugural year in the Nonpareil Cambridge Academy. The brainchild of our Head Master, Mr A D Pinheiro, has become an exciting reality.

The goals for the academy are twofold. We gained recognition from the Cambridge Assessment International Education and began this year with our first candidates. The staff involved were positive in their approach to taking on an international syllabus and examining structure. Their efforts to master a different syllabus, assessment style and expectations commended. For many of us it was a refreshing and stimulating change from the state syllabus. Commendation must also go to the eight young men who together adapted and mastered this totally new system and approach. They have been extended in such a positive way where their critical thinking and evaluation skills have been tested and developed further.

The second part of the Nonpareil Academy has been an extension programme for those with higher order thinking skills still doing the state syllabus. The selection process for this programme began in the second half of 2017 for grade 8 and 9 boys who showed potential in extending their learning approach and style, and who also were achieving academically already. The boys and the teachers went through an extended training course to change the mindset of traditional teaching to a more facilitator self-directed, approach. In this style learning the facilitator guides and extends the learning outside of the set curriculum using a more autonomous, self-discovery

approach. This means that the boys are taught the basic concepts and are then guided into delving deeper into the content and applying it to real life situations eq: more case studies both local and international. The boys are taught to look further than the basic concepts and this allows for a lot of peer and facilitator collaboration as opposed to the group learning between boys.

It has been an exhilarating year with many of the boys achieving greater success in their respective subjects. There have been many individual success stories of boys who were unhappy in school but bright and deflated. Their personalities have been ignited and their interest and commitment to their work has multiplied. They have all shown a growth in maturity and have accepted greater responsibility for their personal character growth and their work. We know boys work differently in classrooms and the academy seems to provide the right environment that is more dynamic and more suitable to boys' education.

Extensions and renovations are underway to welcome a new group of boys both for the extension and for the Cambridge programmes. More timetables and teachers have been brought in to manage the increased size, grade groups not exceeding 15 boys. The interest and growth has been staggering and a big thank you must go out to Mr Pinheiro for his vision, support and drive in this area, as well as to the Foundation who have shown such wonderful support in terms of the alterations.

The Interesting Story of Fernando Pessoa's Biography

Head Master, Mr AD Pinheiro, presented to the Honorary Consul for Portugal in Durban, Mr Elias de Sousa, a book. What is noteworthy about this particular book, is that it is written about one of Durban High School's most famous Old Boys, world renowned poet Fernando Pessoa; it is written by a former teacher at DHS, Mr Hubert Jennings; and was "found" by DHS Old Boy, Chris Jennings, Hubert's son. And now, decades later, is has been published.

"The Poet with Many Faces" is the first biography of Fernando Pessoa in English and there is quite a story attached to it. In the words of Chris:

"I presume you want to know a bit on how a one-time teacher at DHS came to be interested in Pessoa, learnt Portuguese and became fascinated by the genius of Pessoa long before most people in the English speaking world became aware of this. Went twice to Portugal, once on a Gulbenkian scholarship, befriended Pessoa's family and was given access to a room full of Pessoa's papers. As a remarkable classical scholar, who wrote beautiful English and was a published poet in his own right he was able to do some beautiful translations of numerous of Pessoa's poems. Apart from an earlier publication on Pessoa in Durban, his book on Pessoa "The Poet with Many faces" was written the 60's and was being prepared for publication in 1968 when a revolution in Portugal and the suicide of one of the main promoters of the book caused it to be shelved. 24 years after my father's death it was found in the rafters of my daughter's garage when she moved to Cape Town. This, together with boxes full of my father's papers mostly on Pessoa.

Not knowing whether these were of interest to anyone in the Pessoan world we sent an inventory of these to Universities round the world including, Oxford,

Yale, Brown, Lisbon, South America, etc and to our huge surprise were amazed at the interest these engendered. We eventually handed everything over to Brown who had promised to scan everything and make it all available to anyone interested. This has been done and several symposia on my father's work have been held at Brown with attendants coming from all over the world. I understand a number of books and theses are in progress based on my father's work about which my sister and I were completely unaware."

A fascinating story indeed.

Ethelbert Child and Youth Care Centre also gives their heartfelt thanks for our hard work and support for their Centre and the work they do.

In the words of Nelson Mandela, "What counts in life is not the mere fact that we lived. It is what difference we have made to the lives of others that will determine the significance of the life we lead."

It is up to all of us, young and old, to take action and build each other up. This project proves that it is not impossible nor hard to make a difference or be part of making a difference in people's lives.
